The schnitzels were huge and enjoyed by most!

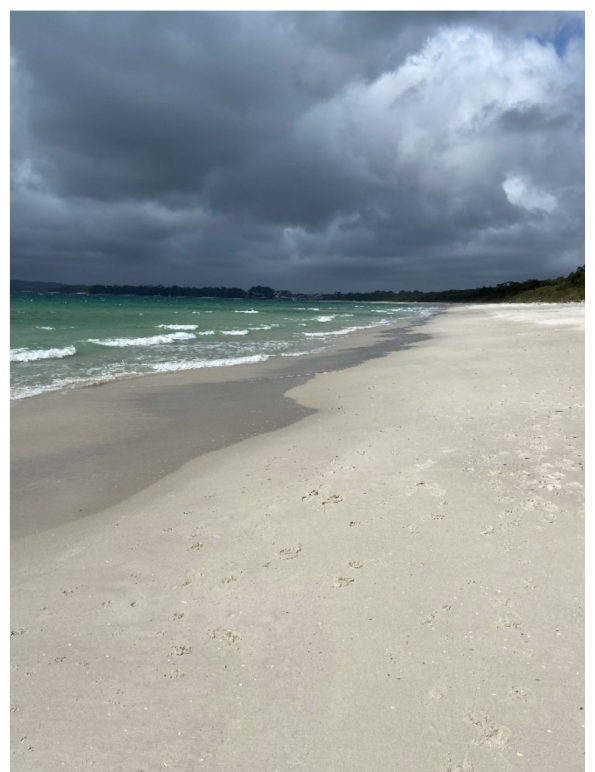

The Seahorse II wet submarine was created by Lt Sergio Pucciarini, an ex-frogman from the WWII Italian Navy's Decima MAS. They used the human torpedoes to sink Allied ships in the Mediterranean.

He believed there would be a demand for a recreational version of the sub. These were produced from the mid 1950s to the mid 1960s. Due to their later work there is little public information. As the sub was not very successful the company, COS.MO.S., went into making military versions. Before the company folded they were making dry, one atmosphere subs.

This sub was found in Australia. It is powered by a 48V electric motor. Originally it was said to have a 4 hour run time with special batteries. Later it was said to have a one hour run time with standard batteries. The batteries would have been 4 x 12 Volt batteries the same or similar to old car batteries.

Specifications: 4.3m long, 810mm wide, weight 227kg, Motor – 18HP, 3400RPM using a 5:1 reduction gear. Two forward and two reverse speeds up to 6.4km/h underwater and 9.7km/h on the surface.

Dive Report: Shelley Beach, 18 October

Another classic Shelley Beach dive with five divers in the water and shore support by three humans and Benny.



Dive Report: Kurnell, 20 October

Kurnell Dive Report It was a perfect day for a dive at Kurnell. After a quick gear check, our group of five divers waded into the calm water from a small sandy beach and swam about five minutes towards a ledge that would take us into a true diver's wonderland. Though the water was a fresh 16 degrees at depth, the underwater magic truly made us forget the chill.

The first surprise greeted us almost immediately—a large wobbegong lounging under a ledge, its enormous tail lazily sticking out. Better not to disturb sleeping giants, so we moved along, only to be treated to an even rarer sight. A. suddenly signalled, and there it was—a massive weedy sea dragon, gracefully gliding through the water. As it wasn't in any rush, we all had plenty of time to take in the spectacle.

As if that wasn't enough, the vibrant sponge garden came alive around us, bursting with colour and marine life. Bright red biscuit stars and mosaic sea stars competed with the many nudibranchs in bright colours for our attention. It felt like we were swimming through an underwater art gallery.

After just over 60 minutes in the water, all were in agreement: this dive was one for the books. To finish this perfect dive, we gathered for a picnic in the park and are reminded again why we dive—great company & incredible sights.



Dive Report: Bushrangers Bay, 06 November

Bushrangers Bay saw a double dive by RUCites with eight divers and two Dive Support. It was a great day and yes we all found Grey Nurse Sharks.



Dive report: Callala Bay, 09-10 November

Point perpendicular 9th November

Four divers and a bot skipper braved the overcast to head to the inside of Point Perpendicular. Just outside the outer tubes no anchor zone we found a good dive site with water extremely clear. Herb, Mal, Ross and Diego braved the 18 degree water while Bruce enjoyed the gentle breeze and eventual sunny skies while minding the boat. A good spot with lots of life including a large ray.

Bowen Island 10th November

This was the Sunday of the club weekend away at Callala Bay (Jervis Bay). The idea was to get out early so we could be back before lunch in time to pack up and head back to Sydney on Sunday afternoon.

The night before we had 5 divers keen to get out early the next day. In the morning, Susan decided that she'd had too much junk food the night before and wasn't feeling the best so now we were down to 4 divers.

Herb checked the weather and found high winds reported down south which may arrive at Jervis bay before we got back from the dive so there was a bit of nervous checking of the weather updates every 10 minutes. Subsequent updates showed the wind wasn't moving

up the coast as fast as predicted so the decision was made to get out and back before the wind hit.

Bruce towed the boat to the ramp where captain Herb took over. The trip out was across flat seas so we made good time traveling at over 20 knots. Mal had studied the charts and suggested that there was an underwater ridge extending out from the north west corner of Bowen island which maybe worth investigating.

It was on the way out that Mal discovered that he'd left his weight belt back in the car. We had some spare weight belt webbing and 3 spare weights but that was not enough to keep Mal on the bottom. For a brief moment, we even considered tying the spare anchor to his waist but in the end Mal kept Herb company on the boat while Ross, Diego and Dave did the dive.

We anchored just outside the sanctuary zone, where anchoring is permitted. The visibility was not good in the first few meters but once we got below that layer the vis opened up to a good 10 meters. Even though there weren't many fish (unlike the dive the day before at the outer Tubes) there were lots of big boulders covered with all sorts of fixed life. This was a macro photographers dream and as result we didn't have to wander too far from the anchor.

Before the dive, we agreed to save some air for a second (quick) dive on the wreck of the Firefly (<https://www.environment.nsw.gov.au/maritimeheritageapp/ViewSiteDetail.aspx?siteid=2387>) so at about 100 bar remaining, Diego indicated it was time to find the anchor and surface.

Back on board the wind and swell had picked up so the captain made the call to head back to Callala bay and skip the Firefly this time.

Bruce was there to meet us at the ramp. We retrieved the boat and gave it a wash at the ramp ready for the tip back to Sydney.

A nice ending to a great weekend.

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nudibranchs. All of this framed against the colourful sea tulips, sponges and the odd soft coral. Big friendly gropers looking suggestively at our dive knives then back to the black urchins reminding us that, contrary to Kurt Cobain's song lyric, fish actually DO have feelings.

After getting skittled on the exit, Noel and Jenneane handed us survivors fruit drinks and very welcome chocolate biccies. Thanks buddies.

Dive report: Shiprock, 22 November

As there are a few “longer term” members who can dive mid-week we decided to give the site a try on a Friday when the traffic through the site would be low. In fact there were no other divers and the high tide was 2:00 pm.



Shiprock was always an exciting place to dive when I started underwater back in the early 80s. In the “good old days” we would slither down a dirt track and attack the rock step half way down with the vigour of youth. Now there is an easily trafficked set of stairs and a rock steps to get into the water.

The three of us arrived around 1:00pm to give us lots of time to gear up and take the long downward journey on the stairs with all our gear and cameras in tow. There were a few swimmers and sunbathers on the platform at the water's edge. Something I'd never come across before but it is a pleasant spot down at the water's edge.



At high tide we'd expected the current to be slack however it was still running inward and continued to do so during the entire dive. It made the outward journey slow and we all use a bit more air than expected however the return trip was a quick one. ?Next time we might get in after high tide to see if we can get the slack.

Dive sites change

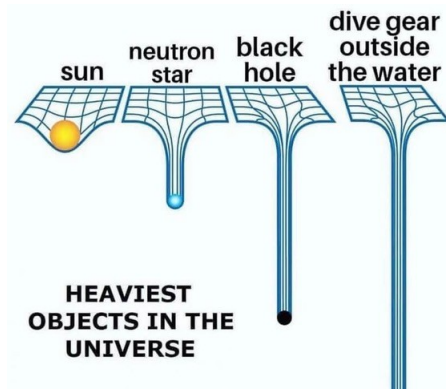

We came across hermit crabs, an electric ray, morwongs, leather jackets and a couple of stingrays. No nudibranchs sighted but I did spot the egg trail of Vercos Tambja (Parramatta Nudibranch).



After about an hour in the water we decided to storm the steps out and hit the local coffee shop. We had to brave all the school kids on their electric bikes. Still a very cruisy dive and good company with no crowds to deal with.

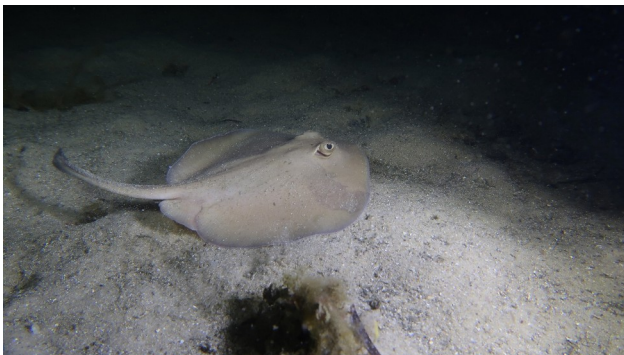


Dive Report: Clifton Gardens Night Dive, 27 November

Mid week night dives were discussed at the November club meeting so I volunteered to kick it off and be the Dive Activity Leader (DAL) for the first to be held on Wednesday 27th November.

The plan was to

- Meet in the car park at 7:30pm
- Parking is free from 8pm
- Tide 6:38pm 1.34m
- Sunset 7:48pm
- Enter to water at 8pm for a one hour dive
- Bring a primary dive light and a [Marker Light](#)
- After the dive the plan was to have dinner at [Hotel Mosman](#) (kitchen open until midnight)
- Given we haven't done much night diving recently we plan to limit our dive to the area around the nets



Arriving at the car park at 7:15pm I was surprised to see all the divers were already there and getting their gear together. A swarm of flying ants were being a bit of a bother but after waiting around a bit for it to get dark, we geared up and headed off to the netted swimming enclosure.

Linda and Susan took up a bench seat by the beach to look after the car keys and relax with some drinks and nibbles. Brett and Noel

turned up just as we were getting ready to get in the water.

Sarah and Robert buddied up and were first in the water. Bruce, Mal and I were next in. We submerged near the beach in only 1.8m of water and I found it difficult to stay on the bottom but I got my buoyancy under control once the water depth increased to over 2m. I took an Ultra Violet (UV) dive light with me to see what would fluoresce. I didn't have to look very long before I saw a tiny cuttle fish which lit up bright green when illuminated with UV. Next a big Nudi did a similar thing. I tried getting photo of this effect but it looked better to the naked eye than it does in the photos.



Swimming around the net Mal spotted some Sea horses and I could see Bruce's strobe going off indicating he was taking lots of photos.

We did see some small rays as well but talking to Sarah and Robert after the dive we found out we missed seeing a big ray "as wide as your car".
